Keiaikan

' Keiai ' means caring for each other and ' Kan ' means building, so the literal meaning of ' Keiaikan ' is the building of caring for each other. The famous Japanese writer, Kaibara Ekiken, noted for his book, Youjyokun, said, " ... it is caring for each other that is important in the relationship of friends ". The Keiaikan built in June, the fifty seventh year of Showa(1982) and opened in April, the fifty eighth year of Showa(1983), is a 602.04m² . two story facility with a cafeteria, an audio room, meeting rooms, and a lounge. Due to its unique design, its capability has been extended to regular classroom programs as well as club activities.



Seiwakan

' Seiya ' means achieving the peaceful relationship, so, the literal meaning of ' Seiwakan ' is the building of achieving the peaceful relationship. The Seiwakan was built in March, the fifty first year of Showa(1976) for the purpose of student's club activities and teacher's meetings. Its one story construction of 207m². facilitates an assembly hall (40 tatami), three meeting rooms(10,8,and 6 tatami, respectively), and public baths.
